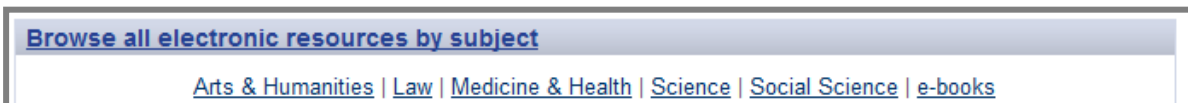


Library Helpsheet: MetaLib (1)


MetaLib is the UEA Library's search tool for accessing online information resources - subscription journal databases, ebook collections and selected free Web portals.

Using MetaLib you can quickly see the online resources that are recommended for your subject area. You can link to these resources to search them directly, or select multiple resources and use MetaLib to search them simultaneously. MetaLib can be used on and off-campus.

Or go to <http://mlsfx.uea.ac.uk/V> . MetaLib will open at the 'CrossSearch' tab:



1. Login if you're off-campus, or if you want to save search results

2. Select subject category and sub-category

3. Click on 'i' icon to find out more about each resource

4. Link direct to database, or check boxes to CrossSearch search multiple resources

5. If you are using MetaLib to cross-search different resources, enter your search terms in the search box, and click GO



6. Once your CrossSearch is complete you can view combined results or results by individual resource

Once you have your list of results you can:

- A:** Filter your results using the options on the right of the screen, or the Refine option
- B:** Sort results by relevance (rank), year, author etc.
- C:** See more results by clicking on 'combine more'
- D:** View the abstract by clicking on the article title or the 'Full view' option
- E:** View your options for reading the full text of the article, online or in print format, by clicking on the SFX or FT (Full Text) icon
