This is the only city centre gardening event of the year and alongside gardens constructed especially for the event, there will be specialist plants available to buy.

The Event forms part of CUE East's Sustainable Living Event and we will have many organisations with tips on making your garden more wildlife friendly. There will also be advice on growing vegetables and keeping chickens for those that want to try 'farm gardening'.

This year we will be linking up with BBC Springwatch and for the first time premiering and showcasing films in Fusion that show the importance of gardening to the environment, both here in Norfolk and other parts of the world. They will include examples from the Your Garden feature on BBC

Radio Norfolk, where listeners have sent in photos and film of their gardens.

We will also have a new Garden Trail, where individuals and businesses open their doors to show how they have been working to make wildlife friendly areas in Norwich City Centre.

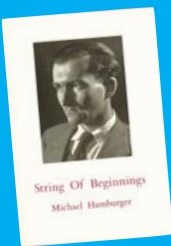
Michael Hamburger Exhibition
